



## from the EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



## **LOWENSTINE WWII ROLL OF HONOR UNVEILING**


## Saturday, December 10, 2p

PoCo Muse, 20 Indiana Avenue

In 1943, the American Legion had an idea to erect a Roll of Honor on the east lawn of the courthouse square to commemorate the efforts of those from Valparaiso who served in World War II. Local resident and business owner Mandel Lowenstine was the lead benefactor. Thirty-one years later, the memorial was reinstalled on the first floor of the 1871 Porter County Jail, then the brand-new home of the Porter County Museum, where thousands of visitors have scanned its names.

On December 10. in commemoration of the attack on Pearl Harbor, the Lowenstine Roll of Honor will make a third home in the new PoCo Muse at 20 Indiana. Join us for light refreshments during the unveiling and stay for a reading of local residents' memories from December 7, 1941.

# UPCOMING EXHIBITS OPENING IN OCTOBER

On Friday, September 30, the PoCo Muse bids farewell to the groundbreaking exhibition A Calumet Tapestry which opened the new PoCo Muse at 20 Indiana in May 2022. With the departure of this debut exhibition, we begin the transition to a regular exhibit schedule for our three galleries: Robert Cain Gallery, Main Gallery, and Montague/Urschel Gallery.

The Robert Cain Gallery reopens to the public on Friday, October 7. It honors Robert "Rob" Cain, a lifelong Valparaiso resident and beloved Valparaiso High School art teacher who died on June 30, 2022. Nine years ago, with the help of the Urschel family, whose members were inspired by Cain from their time in his classroom, he participated in the dedication of the Robert Cain Gallery in the former PoCo Muse location at 153 Franklin Street in Valparaiso. The PoCo

Muse will maintain Cain's legacy in the same fashion at its new Robert Cain Gallery at 20 Indiana Avenue. Like his classroom of years past, the gallery will feature both Cain's work and a revolving display of other artists' works from our collection.

Also opening on October 7 is the *Prehistoric Pop-Up*. The pop-up exhibit, launched during the Porter County Fair for ten days this July, where we enjoyed sharing a great local story of how mastodon bones were discovered on the Myron Benedict farm five miles from the fairgrounds. Seen by over 6,000 people visiting the fair, the *Prehistoric Pop-Up* makes its way to the Main Gallery until October 30 as the team prepares for the exhibition opening of *Connections* on November 10.

# NEW EXHIBIT, CONNECTIONS, OPENING IN NOVEMBER

Why do museums continue to collect objects? It's an interesting question, especially in an age when information is instantly available. The PoCo Muse believes objects tell important stories, and engaging with them can lead to surprising discoveries. A museum's job is to help make these connections.

The PoCo Muse Collection boasts an eclectic assortment of artwork and artifacts gathered over our 106 years of preserving Porter County history and culture. Like all museum collections, it is actively growing and changing. With every new object added, the collection continues to evolve. We sometimes have to step back and consider the entirety as if from 10,000 feet above; only then can we see how it all fits together.

Over the past year, as the PoCo Muse made preparations to create a suitable, climate-controlled environment for our growing collection, we had to work intimately with the thousands of objects entrusted to our care. Our perspective changed. Rather than stepping back, we took a closer look. We started to find that objects shared rather unexpected similarities with each other. In short: we started making connections.

On November 10, we present our discoveries with a new exhibition, aptly named Connections. Gathered throughout are pairs of objects that speak to each other in surprising ways. The objects may appear different at first glance, but after closer consideration, they may reveal an important relationship. The exchanges cover a wide range of subjects, from industry to sports to space travel, and reflect similarities of form, function, and context. As you join their conversations, we hope you consider the ways these objects connect with those you encounter in your own daily life.

The genre of photography known as cartes de visite grew in popularity in the second half of the 19th century and offered consumers a relatively cheap way to obtain portraits of loved ones or famous figures. These cartes de visite—an early form of postcards—were assembled by Rose Howe into a souvenir album of her family's trip abroad in Europe, displaying notable landmarks and locals in traditional garb.

# LOWENSTINE'S DEPARTMENT STORE

Lowenstine's Department Store was an anchor of Valparaiso's commercial district until it was destroyed by a fire in 1996. This image from the early 1970s shows the storefront decorated festively for the winter holiday season. Tinsel from the large ornamental candles twinkled on that particularly clear winter day.

# HOLIDAY WINDOW DISPLAY

This image shows the Specht Finney storefront decorated for the winter holidays during the First World War. A close inspection of the ring surrounding the star reveals the words, "Happy New Year." An impressive level of care went into this display, from the coordinated twirls of the streamers to the perfectly organized towers of canned fruits and vegetables.




### new ACQUISITIONS


Thanks to the generosity of Jeffrey Neeley & Virginia Cheung, the PoCo Muse has acquired the rights to the late George E. Neeley's 1989 publication, Valparaiso: A Pictorial History. Neeley's book is still regarded as one of the best Porter County histories, and we are thrilled to officially have it as part of our collection.

The author, George Neeley (1924-2011), resided in Valparaiso for most of his life. His maternal grandparents were early Porter County settlers in Pleasant Township, and he spent his boyhood in the countryside just outside of Valparaiso.

Neeley graduated from Morgan Township High School in 1942. After service in the United States Navy during World War II, he completed a B. A. degree at Valparaiso University in 1950. From 1952 until 1987, he owned and operated Neeley's Men's Shop.

Neeley's interest in history was inspired by tales about his ancestors. His maternal grandfather operated the Valley Gun Club near Baum's Bridge, a well-known hunting lodge on the Kankakee River. His father was a country schoolmaster, farmer, and village merchant who was the last proprietor of the Malden General Store.
