



Furnessville, a small community in Pine Township, was originally a fueling station for the Michigan Central Railroad until the 1890s when trains started using coal. In 1890, the Chesterton Tribune proclaimed that the village was the strawberry capital of the United States. Years later, when berry farmers could not get a worthwhile price from Chicago buyers, they plowed their fields and began farming corn, wheat, and hay. The next decades brought many new visitors to Furnessville and in the 1930s the village became a destination for artists from Chicago, including Vin and Hazel Hannell.

In the summer of 1930, the homes of Furnessville were photographed for perhaps the last time in their original location. Many homes were moved in order to make room for the new "relief road" (today Route 20) that was constructed along the northern side of the New York Central Railroad. While many homesteads were relocated further from the construction, one stayed close. The Williams' homestead, though moved to a new location, still had Route 20 out its front door.



FAQ

What is the Montague/Urschel Gallery (MUG)?

The Montague/Urschel Gallery, or MUG, is a new local art museum of the PoCo Muse that focuses primarily on historical Porter County art and artists. "Gallery" appears in the museum's name because there is presently one gallery space for curated featured exhibits, which will change approximately every six months.

Does the MUG open early for members?

Yes. The MUG is open early for our members and their guests Thursday through Sunday, between 10-11a.

Will I have to wear a mask?

We require you to follow the current CDC guidelines, which can be accessed online at cdc.gov.

When can the general public visit the MUG?

The MUG is open to the general public with free admission from 11a until 4p, Thursday through Sunday, with some exceptions for holidays.

Does the MUG have an admission fee?

No. There is no general admission fee to visit the MUG, but our members get exclusive early access from 10-11a on every normal day of operation.

Am I currently a member?

How many guests can I bring for a MUG visit during member hours?

This depends on your membership. You have the option of choosing benefits


for one, two, or four. If you chose benefits for one, you cannot bring any quests. Donors to our Founders' Society can bring two additional guests per level. For example, a donor at the Supporter level (\$1,000) can bring a total of nine guests per visit.

How is the MUG funded?

Frank Virgil Dudley loved the Indiana Dunes. Described by art historian William Gerdts as "one of the finest painters working in the Midwest in the first decades of the twentieth century," Dudley dedicated most of his professional painting life to preserving the Dunes, with the eventual goal of establishing them as protected parkland. This painting captures the essence of the dunes and attests to Dudley's artistic legacy. Thanks to the efforts of Dudley and other artists, conservationists, and legislators, a signicant portion of Indiana's duneland is now protected.

PoCo Muse Film Critic Jeff Schultz revisits and reviews *Love Story*, which ran for 14 days at the Premier Theatre back in 1971.




Image • Advertisement for the Premier Theatre from The Vidette-Messenger. May 10, 1971.
